Mathematics

This term we will focus on place value knowledge to 1,000 and building on addition and subtraction strategies, aiming to use them fluently.

We will be practicing to count in steps of 6,7,9,25

Round any number to the nearest 10, 100, 1,000

We will add and subtract numbers including 4 digits and ones; 4 digits and tens; 4 digits and hundreds. Firstly, mentally and then we will start to use written columnar written methods.

We will estimate the answer to a calculation and use the inverse operations to check our calculations. We will work on missing number problems.

We will develop our reasoning and mathematical language to explain our answers. E.g. 'What's the same?' 'What is different?'.
