The next elements to be constructed will be the school hall and offices.

LIDL have been working closely with the school and have been in to meet us. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Kier, the Borough and all the building related partners, for their hard work and wish them season's greeting.

Finally, I would like to finish by thanking Mrs Colenso who has been working with us two days a week to support the leadership team in the school along with supporting on the building programme. This work was up to the end of December and we wish Mrs Colenso well in her new role in school improvement. We remain deeply grateful for everything she has done to establish what we all know as a wonderful new school.

Deer Park School is a small, diverse community on the outskirts of London. Our curriculum is built from an understanding of this context with the consensus of the school's staff, the school community and the pupils but will always evolve to reflect our school community as we grow.

Our curriculum is everything that happens to pupils in school from Breakfast Club through to Evening Owls and everything in between including trips and visitors. This curriculum balances the development of independence and resilience with the need for support and nurturing.

Through the breadth and depth of our curriculum we inspire curiosity and **enthusiasm** to prepare the pupils for a life-long love of learning that comes from the child's own **happiness** and desire to learn. At each and every stage we encourage our pupils to question what they know and what they want to know.


This curriculum ensures that our pupils become responsive and responsible learners through an understanding of the how our world is made and how our world works. Also, they learn through the significance of events and people and how these have shaped our present world and how we can learn to protect our community and world in the future going forward. In addition, our ambitious curriculum develops pupils' deep understanding of their own physical well-being through areas of the curriculum that develop the physical self: such are PE, PHSE and DT. Our curriculum develops our children's mental well-being through creative subjects that give pleasure and allow appreciation such Art and Music. Nurturing our children through PSHE and RSE to ensure they understand themselves and others and how to sustain their mental wellbeing. Our curriculum immerses our pupils in their diverse school community through RE and PSHE and allows them to **thoughtfully**, compare and contrast this with very different communities locally and around the world in order to develop tolerance and understanding.






Year 3 and 4 girls and year 3 boys have taken part in football competitions—more to come over the next term.
