

A message from the Chair of the LAB – James Boyle

During the Covid lockdown the Local Advisory Board (LAB) has still been active with regular meetings taking place. Topics for discussion and review have focused on pupil learning and welfare when working from home, ongoing performance within the school and various meetings and visits that have taken place. Assessments through the internal Deer Park Self-Evaluation Form and the external School Improvement Partner both suggest that the school continues to perform at an outstanding level although there are concerns about attendance levels being below target. Attendance is one of the criteria that is reviewed in an Ofsted inspection and the current level could affect the school's outstanding rating if it continues. The delays to the permanent school building were also discussed but there is confidence that the school leadership team have robust plans in place for the start of the new school year in September. 






Marsh Class's Review of the Year. Written by Jess.


