Dear Parents, Carers & Friends,

t's hard to believe we're nearly halfway through November. The air is brisk, the afternoons are short, and bicycle lights have become quickly mandatory. Here at Deer Park, the relentless pace of learning continues unabated; it's been a fortnight of workshops, welly walks, field-work, and early morning classes. Perhaps most striking is the continuously high-octane attitudes that our children bring to school each day. These early evenings and colder mornings can, on occasion, dull the mood and dim the motivation – there's been precisely zero evidence of this at school thus far, and the enthusiasm for learning in each classroom continues to be inspirational. Further into our newsletter today is a presentation on a developmental aspect of school life at Deer Park; instrumental music. I believe wholeheartedly - on both a professional and personal level - that every child should learn to play an instrument, and I look forward to hearing your thoughts and feedback on this topic.

Thank you to all those who have participated in fundraising for Children in Need this week. Our online page has been turning over with donations as we work towards our £800 target. As is commonplace at Deer Park, the generosity of our community is exceptional; thank you all. I'd also like to add that charity is relative: we raise money for lots of good causes over the course of a school year, and families should not feel pressured to contribute more than they comfortably can.

It was excellent to see so many parents and families at Ms Coward's reading workshop on Wednesday evening. The feedback received has been fantastic, and I'm sure you'll agree that Ms Coward's expertise and knowledge provided a very helpful framework for supporting children's reading at home. For those families who were unable to attend, I hope the recording and accompanying materials prove formative for you; do contact the school with any questions you might have. Reading remains a high priority for Deer Park, both at home and at school, and the communication between

these two is key to ensuring that the system works for our children. Speaking of reading, it was wonderful to have the Star Readers tea party last Friday! Eight children from across the school joined myself, Ms Philip and Ms Coward for a wonderful (and thoroughly well catered – thanks Ms Coward) celebration of reading.

Earlier this week I contacted parents to inform them of an incident involving a primary school child in Ham. No-one was hurt on this occasion, and the local authority has informed us that no further risk to children is presented by the situation. However, please do maintain your vigilance both for Deer Park children and for others in our community as a matter of course - we all bear responsibility for keeping our children, and the children in our area, safe from harm. For the safety of our community at Deer Park, I'd like to remind each of us to respect social distancing guidelines in the queue at collection and dropoff times. If you are unable to keep a 2m distance for any reason, current guidance is to wear a face covering. Thank you all for continuing to work hard to keep our children and families safe.

The recommended read for Key Stage Two this week is a wonderful contemporary novel. 'The Space we're In' details the lives of Frank and his little brother Max, who has recently been diagnosed with autism. It is a powerful story of family, inclusivity, perspective and loss: I highly recommend it. Our adult book recommendation this week, 'Take my Hand' comes from Mrs Bracegirdle and is rife with suspense throughout a churning plot line. In KS1, we have the always popular 'Astro Girl', as we continue to look at female role models in STEM.

Learning a Musical Instrument &



any children at Deer Park already learn to play a musical instrument, receiving weekly lessons. I strongly and unreservedly encourage all families to consider signing their children up to learn an instrument; it is an incredibly effective way of expanding horizons and developing opportunities. Music carries with it opportunities for teamwork,

individual flair, creativity, social skills, and physical dexterity in a way that is replicated in very few other aspects of everyday life. Beyond this, the impact of instrumental tuition on cognitive development is significant, to say nothing of the avenue for self-expression – such a critical part of the growth of young persons – that music inherently affords.

A few frequently asked questions to help introduce the topic:

What are the benefits of learning a musical instrument?

Perhaps the best known benefit of learning a musical instrument is the self-confidence and self-expression developed throughout the process. More than this, the cognitive and academic

benefits of musical learning are well documented, including the positive impact on memory and spatiotemporal reasoning skills. For those interested, I recommend the work of Psychologists Sarah Wilson and Margot Prior in this field. Music is also, from personal experience, a great deal of fun; playing in orchestras, bands or ensembles is a fantastically broadening experience.

Is it available at Deer Park?

The Richmond Music Trust provides music tutors for the school – either individual or group lessons are available. The quality of music tuition is, we have found, consistently strong. A wide variety of instruments is available, and you can find out more here: https://www.richmondmusictrust.org.uk/site/

What does it cost?

If your child attends a group lesson every week for 30 minutes, lessons are £127 a term. None of this money goes to the school, but we can confidently say that it is very good value considering the quality and attention provided. Fees are higher for Individual lessons, and lower for shorter lessons. You can find the full range here:


Talia (Muntjac)






Class Updales
