E-Safely

Thank you to all the parents who joined our e-safety workshop last week. This is something we will be repeating yearly so don't worry if you missed it this time. A few takeaways that I would like to share with you all. Firstly, I've recently discovered that many online sites for children have a chat function for example, scratch. Scratch is a brilliant site for children to use to learn how to code and make their own games BUT it has a chat function which needs to be very carefully monitored. It is important that the children are constantly reminded that they shouldn't share any of their personal information with people they don't know. When I've spoken to children about this in the past I've been told 'but they're very nice' to which I've explained that without knowing someone you have no idea if they're very nice or not. As we all know it is very easy to let our guard down and be pursuaded that a person is a good person and for children that is even easier to do.

Another top tip is to set the parent controls, see here, on a new piece of equipment before giving it to your child/ren. This will save arguments and difficulites in the long term. Our children are frighteningly good with technology and we need to ensure we stay one step ahead. If you are giving your child a playstation or alternative games console, you can set parent controls which often include the option to set a time zone. By setting the time zone you can restrict the amount of time your child can play on the device on any one day. These controls will also mean that they won't be able to play games or use apps which are above the limit you set.

Here are links to information on **What's App**, which I've just discovered has a recommended age of 16+, **Tik Tok** which has a recommended age of 13+ and **Fortnight**, **Battle Royale** for 12+.

Used safely the internet is a wonderful thing for our children to help them with their learning, to have fun and play games, listen to music or watch films.

It has been so wonderful to see all the children apply their **phonic knowledge** to their writing. In **maths** we recapped our numbers from 6-10 and then we have been exploring height. The children are using such wonderful vocabulary when they are explaining things to do with height. Our famous welly walks are back, and the children have loved looking out for minibeast's which are in our book superworm.





We are all happy to get back to a normal school routine and be among our friends. The first week we reminded ourselves of our classroom rules and talked about our feelings with the help of the book, 'Even Superheroes Get Scared'. Our Zen Den yoga has taught us that worry and feelings of anxiety can be managed by taking in a big breath and using a tool called 'anchor', which helps us feel calm, brave and focused, through making us think of a happy place to be in. In Maths, we revised numbers from 6 to 10. We developed the skill of subtising and comparing quantities. We also explored further measurements and used different language to describe them. The children also explored free writing and wrote beautiful messages to their mums. With the Superworm book, we thought about our different talents and discovered that we have so many.
