In our recommended read this week, we have an eclectic range of genres. First up, for the younger readers, is the delightful 'Maybe' by Chris Haughton. This wonderfully illustrated book raises important questions for all of us. Are there limits to productive curiosity? Is parental advice worth listening to? And of course the classic: 'Am I likely to be eaten by a tiger if I try to reach that Mango?'. For KS2, this week's tome is somewhat less light-hearted: 'A Monster Calls' by Patrick Ness. Tackling the complexities of grief, of anger, of the churning turmoil of loss and helplessness, this is a book worth reading. It has, interestingly, also been turned into a reasonably watchable film, although Liam Neeson as a gigantic, humanoid tree is a somewhat troubling image to be left with. Lastly, for our adult readers, 'Klara and the Sun' is the most recent book from that master of story-weaving, Kazuo Ishiguro. Ishiguro, by the way, is a

Booker Prize winner, Nobel Prize winner, and a Knight of the Realm, which are a solid few lines for Linked-In, but more importantly he is a superbly subtle creator of worlds: I hope you enjoy his latest.



The Local Advisory Board (LAB) met last week. The key discussion areas were school performance, the new school building and some safety concerns raised with the new location. Quality of education and academic performance remain high with all year groups showing good progress from the start of the year even with the disruption of home schooling. In terms of safety, the proximity of the school to the busy Richmond Road and the turn-in to the Lidl carpark is a concern. Please be vigilant and make your children aware of the dangers. James Boyle (LAB Chair) attended a meeting this week with local residents' associations and council members. During the meeting he raised these concerns. The council have agreed to look at options to increase the safety systems around the school. Previously, residents' groups have expressed concerns about a possible increase to traffic and congestion at drop off and pick up. Sambar Class

Wow what another fantastic few weeks we have had. We have been looking at the story of Goldilocks and the gingerbread man. Sambar class have loved making things to help them re tell the story. We have used our imagination to bring other things to life too. In maths we have been continuing to explore our numbers from 11-20. The children have done a fantastic job in ordering them, playing bingo and making their own number games up. In the outside classroom we have had some lovely new things arrive. The children have loved pumping the water around the water tanks, learning to build with real bricks and balancing on beams. The children loved watching the owls flying around and having a picture with one on their shoulder.

Goldilocks and the Three Bears was a great success with all the children.

The story allowed us to discover more about these **amazing creatures.** The kids worked in pairs, sharing their **knowledge of bears.** Here are some examples of what they said:

"Some bears have sharp claws and sharp teeth to kill and peel the meat." (Lucas and Florence)

"Some bears live in the jungle." (Jono and Michelle)

"Paddington Bear is a spectacled bear." (Sebi)

After this brainstorming session, each pair decided on what else they would like to know about bears.

"I want to know if bears can do tricks." (Rosie)

"Do bears live a long time?" (Greg)
"Why do some bears live in water?"
(Adetti)

We all did some research and came up with the answers. The Goldilocks story gave the children the opportunity to gain an insight into bears in general.

This week we turned our curiosity to avocadoes. Are they a fruit or vegetable? The children wrote down their ideas and guesses. We then read the book, 'Avocado. What am !?' Yes, an avocado is actually a fruit. In Maths, we are continuing to work on

teen numbers - ordering and writing them.

In **P.E.** we have been exploring **spatial** awareness.

The Gingerbread Man is our focus right now and the children are enjoying chanting 'Run, run as fast as you can. You can't catch me. I'm the Gingerbread Man.'
