Dear Parents, Carers & Friends,

appy Friday, and welcome to the tail end of week two. At the end of our first full week of learning in our new premises, I'm delighted to say that the children have taken to the new opportunities and facilities with the enthusiastic and high-octane approach that has come to characterise learning at Deer Park. It has been wonderful to see indoor PE and the full gymnastics curriculum taking place in the hall, painting skills being taught in the bespoke art studio, and the investigative practical science (with plenty of productive mess) lighting up the STEAM room on the second floor. Equally notable is the flexibility and proactivity with which our families have picked up our new routines and logistics; no small feat given the radical change of scenery and I'd like to thank each one of our community for making the move possible with such fluidity and ease.

Parents' evening is around the corner, and we look forward to hosting a virtual evening of important conversations about your child's progress and wellbeing at school. Time slots will be available on Arbor shortly, and conversations will be conducted via Zoom while we continue to observe the Covid—19 regulations of the moment. On the topic of important conversations, you'll find in this newsletter an article on using Thoughtful Words, with suggested conversation topics to have at home. In particular, we look to grow within our children and community an understanding of the power of words, and indeed the choices we make with them that can affect those around us. I would ask each of us to find the short time over this long weekend to have these conversations, and to continue to help our children make oratory choices with their peers that reflect their kindness, inclusion, and respect.

Our recommended reads this week begin with the excellent 'One World Many Colours' for our younger

readers. A vibrant celebration of both geography and artistic inspiration, this book is lyrically written and illustrated with rare precision and skill. For our KS2 readers, this week is an unapologetic classic: 'To Kill a Mockingbird, by the inimitable Harper Lee. The buoyant and stark narration of Scout Finch provides layers of meaning that will appeal to a wide range of readers, and the importance of integrity, equality and human dignity runs deep throughout. It is a book that has graced literature syllabi for generations, and to read it is to understand why. For our adult readers this week, we offer an embrace of childhood joy in the form of 'Wild Thing' by Mike Fairclough. This short and enjoyable tome examines happiness and wellbeing, and how the wide-eyed fearlessness of childhood can be brought into our adult lives. Fairclough, by the way, is a notable educator in his own right - his school's adoption of experiential learning and risk are at the forefront of his field: it's well worth a Google.

Further to our recommended reads, we also have a small quiz this week. In the pages following, you'll find a selection of books and staff pictures which can be matched to reveal who is reading what. I'll offer a short clue, in that my own current reading material is a poetry volume with a canine theme, and leave the rest up to your deliberations.

Have an excellent bank-holiday weekend, don't forget to read, and I look forward to seeing each of you on Tuesday morning.

Thoughtful words

We're very proud of our values at Deer Park. This coming week, we're focusing on being Thoughtful with our words and actions. As part of this, the children will be considering how our words can affect those we talk to, and how to internally moderate the choices we make when speaking to our friends and peers.

We're also extremely proud of our diversity, and the appreciation of each other's cultures, backgrounds and beliefs, that makes us a stronger and more cohesive community. With this in mind, it is important to discuss with our children the words we use to make others feel included – and indeed the choices that could make others feel different, excluded, or self-conscious, particularly when they concern another person's appearance.

Over the longer weekend, please do take the time to talk to your child about using Thoughtful Words when communicating with their friends at school. Considering the effect your question, comment or statement may have on others is an important skill to develop as we grow up, and we can progress these ideas by talking about them with our families and trusted adults.

For example, these question prompts can help structure conversations with your child, to explain the difference between celebrating our differences and making others feel unwelcome.


- How can we ask questions about another person's beliefs respectfully? What language could we use?
- How could it be hurtful or thoughtless to make comments about another person's appearance? How could we avoid this?
- Does it matter what a person looks like? What are the qualities of a person that really matter?

These conversations are crucial components in building our understanding, and in learning to appreciate each other for the characteristics and personal qualities that really matter.
