For our youngest readers, Adam Kay (he of 'This is Going to Hurt' fame) has chosen to write a children's book. The book is dedicated to the serious study of the human digestive system, which is to say that it follows the plight of an excitable piece of sweetcorn who is eaten (on a pizza slice, of all things) and then follows the full course of innards before exiting the process via the usual route. It is enjoyably gross, or just enjoyable, depending who's reading it.

Have a fabulous weekend together, and do remember to read.


